name is Hank Smith. I am your host. I'm here with my co-host John Bytheway. Listen to this John, my co-host John Bytheway,

whose eyes are still in his sockets.

John Bytheway: 00:00:38 Thankfully.

Hank Smith: 00:00:39 Yes, thankfully.

John Bytheway: 00:00:40 Yep, they're still here. Yeah, I got them.

Hank Smith: 00:00:42 John Doctrine Covenants 29 talks about maggots eating flesh,

flesh falling off bones and eyes falling from sockets. A very happy little verse right there. I have a feeling my little boys are going to enjoy this. Our friend Eric Richards is here, one of our favorite people. John, he hasn't been on the show before. Eric,

welcome.

Bro. Eric Richards: Thank you both. All you do, this is awesome.

Hank Smith: John and I have known Eric for, it's been 15 years. Eric has been

speaking with FSY. He's the best of EFY years ago. I don't know if either of you remember that with Gary Bauer, our friend Gary. Eric is one of the best teachers in the church. He's up in Logan teaching at the institute there. John, Eric, we have one section of the Doctrine and Covenants today, section 29. This is quite a section. It's unlike anything we've seen before. John, what are

you thinking going into this?

Sometimes we react LOL about some things. This is WOL. This is a whoa out loud section. Yeah. This is some of the things you see here, including maggots, make you go, what is this about? But it also has a really nice plan of salvation feel to it from beginning to end. A lot of great information about here. So hope it gives people some sense of what in the world is going on here type of a thing.

Hank Smith:

I have two 12-year-old boys and a 15-year-old boy, so I can't wait to read, the flesh shall fall off their bones and their eyes from their sockets, right? I think this is, they'll probably say that's my favorite verse so far this year. Eric, as you've prepared Section 29, what are we going to do today?

Bro. Eric Richards:

The beginning is just beautiful. Verse one, listen to the voice of Jesus Christ, your redeemer, the great I am whose arm of mercy hath atoned for your sin. Is there a more beautiful first verse of any section? It's all about Christ. All scripture points to our amazing, beautiful Savior Jesus. Joseph Smith, he taught this. "The fundamental principles of our religion are the testimony of the apostles and prophets concerning Jesus Christ. That he died, was buried, rose again on the third day and ascended into heaven. And all other things which pertain to our religion are only appendages to it." I think this first verse just testifies of Christ. It's him. It's his voice. He is introducing himself and his marvelous Atonement to us. What a great way to start this section. I was reading last week, a friend of mine and I were texting back and forth, I'm a bit of a word nerd. The word worship is interesting because he's inviting us to worship him. Rightfully so. He is so worthy of our worship. But old English, the original meaning of the word worship was worth shipping if something was worth shipping. That's where the word worship comes from and boy, it has changed me as I think about how I go to church to worship or go to the temple to worship. My effort should be worth shipping to my Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

Wow, I love it. Just verse one, you're feeling the power of this section and I'm sure it's going to continue. John, we mentioned before that Eric hasn't been with us. He's a good friend of both you and me. Introduce him to those listening.

John Bytheway:

Eric has one of the more interesting backgrounds because he grew up attending Mountain View Baptist Church in San Diego and Eric and his mother were baptized. Then Eric later served a mission in Honduras and so did your son. Right? Your son Dawson served there too.

Bro. Eric Richards: 00:04:33 Yeah, he did. So fun.

John Bytheway: 00:04:35 He moved to Utah to teach seminary. He's played water polo

and volleyball at Utah State University. He actually participated in writing online seminary curriculum for a long time. So

welcome Eric.

Hank Smith: 00:04:49 Let's read from the Come, Follow Me manual and then Eric, I'm

excited to just hand this over to you and you walk us through this section. This is how the Come, Follow Me manual starts. "Even though the Church of Jesus Christ had been organized in 1830, many gospel truths were still yet to be revealed. And several early church members had questions. They had read the prophecies in the Book of Mormon about the gathering of Israel and the building up of Zion. How would that happen? The revelations Hiram Page claimed to receive speculated on that subject, which only increased the member's curiosity. Other people wondered about the fall of Adam and Eve and spiritual death. The Lord welcomed these questions in 1830 and he welcomes our questions today, whatsoever ye shall ask in faith, he told the saints, being united in prayer. According to my command, ye shall receive. In fact, as the doctrinally rich revelation in Section 29 shows, the Lord sometimes responds to our questions by giving us truth and knowledge far beyond what we ask." John, you've said that before. Joseph Smith at some point in his life says, I just wanted to know which church to join.

John Bytheway: 00:06:01 That was it.

Hank Smith: 00:06:02 And look how much, look how much the Lord has given me.

Eric, with that beginning, how do you want to take on this

section?

Bro. Eric Richards: 00:06:11 We are encouraged with that introduction to ask questions.

That's part of what we do. We're here because a young boy asked a question in a grove back in 1820 and I've noticed with young adults that I am able to be with, sometimes they wonder, where do I go to find these doctrines? Like what counts as official doctrine? We've had some really fun discussions in my classes over the last few years about that. And you know, we have our core doctrine that Jesus came, lived, died, rose again. That is our core doctrine. We have some official teachings and those can change with time. Conference talks, Liahona, Ensign, our church materials websites, we have some supportive teachings that we love. BYU's Religious Studies Center is awesome. The RSC, our devotionals we have, BYU campuses. We have policy, kind of policy doctrine that can change as well.

That general handbook the newsroom side of the church. And then we have kind of those esoteric teachings that are perhaps taught by a few apostles and prophets. Maybe they threw them out there as different ideas and things they were thinking on, but they're interesting, obviously not essential. I think as we search for truth that in doctrine, as the introduction to this week's Come, Follow Me teach, it's so important to know where that level of truth fits in big picture so that we're actually consuming good doctrine, good truths that are eternal and will help us return to our Savior Jesus Christ.

Hank Smith: 00:07:44

This would be what <u>Elder Corbridge</u> called the primary questions. Let's get these first. There are secondary questions that are fun to look at. That talk was called Stand Forever. I have all of my students read that BYU devotional. So Eric, it seems like we're going to have some first rate primary questions in this section.

Bro. Eric Richards: 00:08:05

There are so many. Because this section, like John said in the introduction, it's a plan of salvation type section, not in chronological order, but boy, these topics are amazing, you know, looking verse two, you know, just his invitation for gathering it says he who will gather his people even as a hen gather her chickens under her wings. What great imagery of this gathering. A couple months ago now you had <a href="Chelsea Chipman">Chelsea Chipman</a> on with section 10. She pointed out to us verse 67 of Doctrine & Covenants 10. Behold, this is my doctrine, whosoever repenteth and cometh unto me, the same is my church. Interesting that anyone that repents and wants to come unto Christ, that is his church. As I was thinking through that, Christ, we have evidence of his mission farewell in <a href="Luke chapter four">Luke chapter four</a> and notice that his topic for his missionary farewell talk was that of restoration and coming unto him.

Let me read that. You know the story, He comes "to Nazareth, where he had been brought up as custom was he went into the synagogue on the Sabbath day. He stood up to read. There was delivered unto him the book of the prophet Esaias. When he had opened the book, he found the place where it was written The Spirit of the Lord is upon me because he hath anointed me to preach the gospel to the poor. He sent me to heal the broken hearted, to preach deliverance to the captives and recovering of sight to the blind, to set at liberty them that are bruised to preach acceptable year of the Lord. And he closed the book and he began to say to them, this day is this scripture fulfilled in your ears." He wants people to know out of the gates as he begins his ministry, that he is here to heal.

He is here to promote happiness and peace and provide any type of relief from any ailment that anyone is feeling. This gathering in Section 29, verse two I think is the same thing. Up in Logan, Patrick Mason, he's at Utah state and he has written and said so many things on that topic and interesting. He pointed out to us in a meeting recently that the term restored church wasn't really used during Joseph's time. It wasn't until 1913 James E. Talmage used the term restored gospel. It was only used three times before the year 1900 originally. This gathering and restoration was about restoring god's people to him. The term restoration, even the Book of Mormon, was more about restoring our souls to our heavenly Father from Alma 11, Alma 42. I love that. Verse two is an invitation. Look, we're trying to gather you so we can restore you to God. Yes, we are restoring a church and a system and a governance and priesthood keys. The end purpose of that is to restore God's people to him. And what a great introduction from our Savior Jesus Christ.

John Bytheway: 00:11:08

I love that verse you read in Luke four. Sometimes I'll quiz my students, Hey, what is the best Old Testament verse you can think of to describe the Savior after we hum and haw for a minute. You know what, we don't have to choose one because Jesus chose it. He chose it and he chose to focus on, he came to heal the broken hearted. I've always just loved that. It doesn't speak of wrath or judgment or punishment. His focus is I've come to liberate captives to heal the broken hearted. Okay, here's a question I've always had for you two about that verse. Did Jesus say hand me the scroll of Isaiah or did the minister hand him a random scroll or did he deliberately choose that? I've always wondered how that worked because I think he knew exactly what he was doing and maybe it was all meant to be that he got Isaiah 61 right that verse.

Hank Smith: 00:11:56

Yeah, I think the Lord in the spirit world must say to Isaiah, still love your book. Right? Have it on my bedside stand. Yeah. I think whenever the Lord wants us to learn about him, he says, why don't we read from Isaiah if it was just handed to him? I think it's the one he would've chosen anyway.

John Bytheway: 00:12:14

Yeah, and I loved Eric that you said that, what did you call it? It's

like his announcement of his mission.

Bro. Eric Richards: 00:12:20 Yeah his farewell.

John Bytheway: 00:12:21 Right? Yeah, that's a great way to put it.

Hank Smith: 00:12:23

Yeah. He's starting his mission. This is it. Just on a side note, both of you, we've actually talked about this before we hit the record button. I have noticed John, our best episodes, my best lessons, my best talks that I've given if I'm focused on healing, delivering, if I'm focused on those things, I feel good afterwards. But sometimes I've tried to impress, I've thought about what are people thinking about me? That person in the back, they're observing my class. Do they like what they're hearing? Do I sound smart enough? Those lessons usually fall flat. Obviously I don't think the Savior intended that, but I do think that there's a pattern there for us as teachers. Focus on what can heal today.

Bro. Eric Richards: 00:13:07

And that imagery, that's what the mom chicken does. That's what the hen does. She wants to protect and gather and heal her little chicks. And that's what Christ is inviting us to do and enjoy that peace and safety and protection and mercy and power that comes through his gathering. This section is one of those, it is 50 verses we can't do all of them, but you know, look at verse four. Verily I say unto you that ye are chosen out of this world to declare my gospel with the sound of rejoicing and with the voice of a trump. I had a colleague that overheard a conversation with President Hinckley. They happened to be in the same elevator at the same time and as they were going up and that's have to be quite the moment when you're in an elevator with a prophet of God, he's just bantering.

He made a comment that my friend mentioned that he felt like there were too many pickle suckers in the church. Just people that were a little bit sour. And granted there are some heavy things in this world. I don't want to minimize those at all. But this idea in verse four that we're supposed to declare the gospel with the sound of rejoicing. It's interesting all throughout scripture, you know, we're commanded to be light and yeast and you'll be the salt of the earth. We're supposed to help those that suffer in any way we possibly can to heal those broken hearts, promote peace and happiness. One of my colleagues, another friend of mine, he used this analogy, I've stolen it and he heard it from another guy. It's one of those that's maybe been shared here and there, but a lot of my students are in a school there at the university. And so this idea of a scholarship, there's two different scholarships that someone could qualify for. First is the hardworking Latter-day Saint scholarship. To qualify for it, you need to be a Latter-day Saint. You have to score above 31 on the ACT, you have to have a 3.9 GPA or higher. You have to take at least 12 credits every semester. Each year your progress is reevaluated to see if the scholarship will continue. Hank and John, would you consider that scholarship to be a gift or a reward?

Hank Smith: 00:15:24 Oh wow. That sounds like work. Right? Sounds like payment

almost for all that work.

Bro. Eric Richards: 00:15:33 Listen to the other scholarship. They called this the Grace

Scholarship. First of all, full tuition in addition to tuition, books, fees, a meal plan, free tutoring, a brand new laptop every year, a cell phone upgrade every year. No GPA requirement, no credit hour minimum, no conditions to keep the scholarship. It's offered freely to all who ask for it. Would you consider that scholarship to be a gift or a reward? That sounds like a gift. That's our gospel. I really think that when the Lord invites us to declare his gospel with the sound of rejoicing, I think that's the message that we need to shout from the rooftops. It's just beautiful. And I think sometimes we get worried about, am I doing enough and baking enough bread and enough trips to the temple and am I fasting exactly 24 hours? And those things are all good, don't get me wrong. But boy, the gift that free gift of

grace that he's given us is marvelous.

Hank Smith: 00:16:39 Eric, doesn't that just bring to mind Elder Kearon's talk,

Welcome to the Church of Joy. He says, we are members of the Church of Jesus Christ. We are members of the Church of Joy. And nowhere should our joy as a people be more apparent than when we gather together each Sabbath in our sacrament meetings to worship the source of all joy. Here we assemble with our ward and branch families to celebrate the sacrament of the Lord's supper, our deliverance from sin and death and the Savior's powerful grace. Just what you said, Eric, here we come to experience the joy, refuge, forgiveness, thanksgiving and belonging found through Jesus Christ. My accent's not as good as his, but everyone should go back this week from that verse four, the sound of rejoicing and listen to that talk.

Bro. Eric Richards: 00:17:30 John, if I could pick on you, you know verse five has one of your

favorite principles about him being an advocate. You have taught so much on that topic. Can you insert here just something that you love about him being our advocate?

John Bytheway: 00:17:42 Oh, you're so nice. <u>Elder Holland</u> recently wrote a book called A

Witness for His Names. You love words, went through all of these different names for the Savior. For me right now, Advocate is my favorite nickname for the Savior. When you think of an advocate, there's at least three parties involved. There's someone is going to advocate for someone else. The more I've read about it, the more I see it like an advocate is like an attorney for the defense. This verse along with some others, in fact I thought we might talk about this. So I opened up my favorite advocate verse is First John chapter two verse one.

Speaking of joy, and if any man sin, let's say if any woman sin, if any man sin, if any teenager sin, if any one sin, we have an advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ, the righteous.

I mean talk about good news. That's how this section starts is so hopeful. Guess what? We have an advocate since you asked. There's an artist who did a lot of paintings that we use. I don't think he's a member of our church. I think he was a Seventh Day Adventist named Harry Anderson. Just Google Harry Anderson, Jesus, advocate, and look at that depiction of the final judgment and notice how it fits with the first few verses of section 45 of the Doctrine and Covenants, which also mentions our advocate there. When I think of an advocate, I think of someone who rushes to your side to advocate you before the Father, which is a very hopeful image to imagine.

Hank Smith: 00:19:25

Yeah, I looked it up before we got here, John. To publicly support a person who represents another person's interest, a person who upholds or defends a person, that's exactly what you want in the Lord.

John Bytheway: 00:19:41

Yeah, what the Savior does there in section 45, I'd just like to read this and I know we're going to be coming up on section 45 later, which is another amazing section. But listen to starting verse three. And this is the Savior talking. Listen to him who is the advocate with the Father who is pleading your cause before him saying, Father, behold the sufferings and death of him who did no sin in whom thou is well pleased, behold the blood of thy son, which was shed, the blood of him whom thou gavest that thyself might be glorified. Wherefore, father spare these, my brethren that believe on my name, that they may come unto me and have everlasting life or spare these my sisters that believe on my name. And notice he's not saying spare these that as you just mentioned, Eric, were perfect and fasted for exactly 24 hours. Spare these that believed on my name. Wow, what a hopeful verse. He's not talking about what you did, he's talking about what he did. Being an advocate before the Father for you. Isn't that beautiful?

What an awesome introduction by our Savior here. The reminders of his goodness and and now turning to verse seven, with these truths he's inviting us to go and gather. You are called to bring to pass the gathering of mine elect, for mine elect hear my voice and harden not their hearts. It's interesting. Historically, the Lord has given truths to people all over the world. He loves all of his children. The First Presidency, issued a statement years ago that says that "the great religious leaders of the world, such as Muhammad, Confucius, and reformers, as

well as even philosophers including Socrates, Plato, and others, received a portion of God's light. These moral truths were given to them by God to enlighten the whole nation and to bring a higher level of understanding to individuals. And then they conclude we believe that God has given and will give to all peoples sufficient knowledge to help them on their way to eternal salvation."

I love that. The gathering is of all of God's children and that invitation is given. Hank, you have Mason that's going to go and gather the elect. Washington, DC South. John, your kids have served I think on almost every continent., right? I mean France and Iceland and Tahiti and West Virginia and Uruguay, I mean all over. We've seen that firsthand. Me and my son's able to serve. My daughter's looking to go next year. It's delightful. Obviously that gathering is on both sides of the veil as <a href="President Nelson">President Nelson</a> has taught us. I want to just thank people that have served full-time or service mission, a teaching mission, proselyting mission. If you have invited others to consider the truths of the gospel, I just thank you. If you've gone to the temple to help on that side of the veil, thank you. It's an awesome work that we're doing.

Our ward, we have this little challenge in the Fall, we invited everyone to go to the temple. We had a picture of the temple artists drawn and every time someone went, they could put a sticker on and it became this competition between the Elders Quorum and the Releif Society. And each week there were stickers being put up and our little YSA ward of 150, they wound up doing almost 500 ordinances in two months. It's now shifted to indexing. We're using the Get Involved app. If you're unfamiliar with the Get Involved app, just go to wherever you get your apps, type in get involved. It's an AI way to index names. It's through the family search and it's awesome. We are going to finish that up here in just a few weeks. Our little ward of 150. It looks like we're going to index about 200,000 names. The electricity, knowing that we are providing names to the temple of several stakes worth of people has just been so fun. This gathering that the Lord talks about is so fun. And you, our gatherers, you've seen people gather.

John Bytheway: 00:23:44

Eric, you started out with that example of a hen. And notice the exact words in verse two, who will gather his people even as a hen gathereth. And that is such a wonderful theme that we're hearing. Verse seven, you're called to bring to pass the gathering of mine elect. I don't know about you guys, but after COVID I'm just thinking about gathering to church again. Wasn't

that wonderful just to see everybody and think what a blessing it is just to be able to gather.

Yeah, it's so true. And we've seen these miracle stories of gathering. It's just so fun to watch the Lord work among his children. I read a couple of stories on this. Jason Hinds. This is in the June 2012, <a href="New Era">New Era</a> magazine. He was one of Jamaica's top runners before serving a mission. He was called to New York to the North Mission. The coach, of course, told him to stay home. He had too many prospects in terms of running in the next level, but he decided to serve. So one day they were in Washington Square Park in New York. My daughter lived right by there when she was going to school at Columbia. And so I've seen this park and I've tried to picture this moment. His companion said to this group of performers, Hey, we've got the fastest runner in New York who would like to race him in a race.

All of a sudden this crowd starts to gather together. Poor Elder. He's like, what are you doing? What are you doing? No, no, just watch. This young kid came up and said, well, I'll race you. So they kind of set up this little makeshift starting block. Elder Hinds had his jacket on holding his Book of Mormon and the other guy said, do you want to take your jacket off? Put the book down? Nope, I'm good. So with the mark, set, go Elder Hinds let this guy get a few seconds head start. It wasn't a long race, I'm sure it was probably less than a hundred yards. So after waiting a couple of seconds, he decided to take off, ran the guy down. And as he as he passed him, he held up the Book of Mormon and said, the church is true bro and went on to win the race. And because of that, they became very popular in the area. And every time they came across little groups, they would, you know, ask for the race. He wrote in this New Era article, I ran 77 races on my mission and never lost one.

When they passed a church, the pastor asked his congregates to follow him out into the street and he pointed out these two LDS missionaries and started to rile them up. This group grabbed rocks and started chucking them at these four missionaries. Can you imagine first day in the mission field and you're getting pelted with the rocks? I can't imagine one of the rocks though hit this young Elder, right?

There was a telephone post off in the distance. And so instead of throwing rocks back at these congregates, he turned and threw this rock right in the center, the dead center of that telephone post. And the people took a step back realizing, wow, he could have hit any of us right between the eyes, the old David and Goliath story. And then a few of the people picked up rocks, started to throw them at the telephone pole, and they tried over and over again. Couldn't hit it. Couldn't hit it. One after another, this Elder just hit that telephone post dead center. Well, every time they passed this little church people would come out and would challenge these missionaries to throwing rocks.

O0:27:50 And those rock throwing contests turned into missionary discussions, which turned into convert baptisms. And I've always wondered, you know, years later, when this young Elder is now the mission president, were some of those leaders in that little area, were they some of the rock chuckers from back in the day? What is he good at? He's good at throwing rocks. No matter what our gift, no matter what our talent, we are asked to just bring that to the feet of Jesus. He wants to gather his people together and he can use any amount of talent. If your talent is throwing rocks or running races or if you're good at music or if you're good at ballet or dancing, whatever it is, he can use that gift to forward his work to bring people to his

Wow, that is fantastic. And it just, I don't know, those type of stories are the sound of rejoicing. Declare my gospel with the sound of rejoicing. If every missionary put that verse up in their apartment for a couple of weeks, this is the Church of Joy. As Elder Kearon said, I thought of this verse in Moroni six, the church did meet together off to fast to pray, to speak one with another concerning the welfare of their souls. Because some of these verses are a little bit hard. You think of burning and destruction and that when my daughter went out to New York, this was just after the pandemic started in the subways, they had this cart that they would bring in car by car with a UV light. Literally within just one push of a button that virus would be killed. I historically have thought about the destruction of the wicked as this drawn out long, weeks and months, of people just suffering half dead as it were for maybe days or weeks.

When I looked at the footnotes there, like footnote 18A says a plague. That sounds like what happens during a plague of some kind.

At least to me as I read it, it seems like a description of the fall that we have this garden of Eden state, then we have the fall of Adam and Eve and it could be a list of things that happen with the fall, wickedness, weeping and wailing, death coming upon people, a great and abominable church. Bro. Eric Richards: 00:07 Looking next verses 28 to 34, that's a big chunk. Talk about

another shift. He's now going to teach some doctrine. It's beautiful, especially verse 34. "Wherefore verily I say unto you that all things unto me are spiritual, and not at any time have I given unto you a law which was temporal." Nothing is temporal. All things are spiritual. Wait, tithing, the paying of my temporal money is actually a spiritual practice. The word of wisdom, what I eat, what I avoid is actually spiritual in nature. When I have to bring my family to clean the church Saturday morning, that's actually a spiritual practice, not a temporal practice. I think if we have that approach to our gospel activities that everything, everything the Lord has given us, if I'm reading this correctly, is spiritual in nature. There's nothing temporal. Sometimes in our callings, we might think, man, this is a temporal thing. I'm trying to organize a blood drive or whatever. No, we're doing everything in the gospel for spiritual reasons. I think it gives us a better approach and we can approach it with some confidence that goodness will come, that we will feel connected to Christ, even though it feels very temporally in the moment.

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Hank Smith: 01:26 That's great because sometimes you think, I don't have time to

go to the temple. I don't have time to go serve. I can't go to the meat packing plant, but it's going to help me spiritually. Is that

what you're saying, Eric?

Bro. Eric Richards: 01:39 Yeah. You can see the next verse. He's going to talk about

agency. We can use our agency in terms of how we approach our different gospel duties. You see that in verse 35. I gave unto him that he should be an agent unto himself. That word agency is only used a handful of times in scripture. This is one of them, so it becomes very precious to us. In section 101 that you'll study later, the term that's used is moral agency. Elder Dean I Larson. He was actually quoting Albert Payne, who was one of the contemporaries who wrote with Mark Twain, but he said, an act is only moral if it arises out of knowledge, faith, love, or

religious intent, fear and force have not placed in the kingdom because they don't produce moral actions. They're contrary to God's gift of agency. What a blessing that we have this moral agency that we can make decisions that will help promote our salvation, but also make decisions that will help others come unto Christ.

John Bytheway: 02:39

I've sometimes heard agency defined as freedom to choose. I remember <u>Joseph Fielding McConkie</u> saying, let me give you a better definition. It's the power to act. We're given <u>power</u> to act. As an agent. In some religious traditions, we are predestined to act in a certain way, and isn't this saying something different? Didn't God give us power to act as evidenced by this verse?

Bro. Eric Richards: 03:07

It's one of the greatest gifts of love that our heavenly Father has ever given to us. He can entice us. He can invite us, but at the end of the day, it's going to be our decision to accept those invitations or reject them. There's no compulsion. There's no force. There's no handcuffs. He's inviting us to consider him and his son. In the end, those in the celestial kingdom, it's going to be their decision. We'll read later this year in Doctrine and Covenants that if they are willing to accept those conditions, if they're willing to keep celestial laws, they're going to be in that celestial kingdom. There are some that are only willing to live those terrestrial, telestial lifestyles. It is our choice. He's going to love us, but in the end, he loves our agency. In fact, to the point where you look at the next two verses, this ties in with agency because he then talks about how agency was used in the preearth life where Satan used his agency to rebel, saying, give me thy honor, which is my power.

Also, a third part of the host of Heaven turned he away from me because of their agency, and they were thrust down and thus became the devils and his angels. It's interesting that Lucifer used his agency to rebel against God. Sometimes it's been taught that God had a big meeting and presented a plan and didn't know exactly how it was going to play out, and started asking suggestions from the audience. All these plans were presented. No, it was a calculated rebellion. The use of his agency to rebel and revolt against God is why Lucifer was cast out. We have to make sure that we're making choices that show our allegiance. In verse 40, it talks about the conditions after the fall of Adam and Eve. It says, wherefore it came to pass that the devil tempted Adam and he partook of the forbidden fruit and transgressed the commandment wherein he became subject to the will of the devil.

Notice that that fight for agency began in the pre-earth life, but now continues in mortality. There's something interesting here about the fall that I have loved, says he became subject to the will of the devil. Mosiah 3:19 is one of those beautiful doctrinal mastery verses from seminary. A natural man being an enemy to God and has been since the fall of Adam will be forever and ever, unless he yields to the enticing of the Holy Spirit. We love that passage. In Moses 5:13 it says, from that time forth, men began to be carnal and sensual and devilish. In faculty meeting I learned that in our Book of Mormon student manual, it says, though born innocent, all men through the fall of Adam come into a fallen world and experience a resultant fall of their own. In other words, it's through transgression that one becomes a natural man.

Have you noticed there's a difference between natural man and the fallen man? Fallen man, we're weak. We make foolish decisions. Fallen man happens because of our psychology or biology or our environment. It could be the result of our families or our relationships. The effects of other peoples and the misuse of their agency. Sometimes people are victims of abuse or infidelity or addiction, apostasy. The list goes on and on, and that is part of Fallen man. It's part of our world, but the natural man is different. The natural man is an enemy to God using their agency to rebel against him. In other words, they sin and they continue to sin. They have this fall of their own, and as they sin, they are not interested in seeking repentance. I wonder if a lot of people, myself included, have conflated the idea of fallen man with natural man. I wonder if a lot of my sins and mistakes and shortcomings are because I am simply a fallen man and not because I am a rebel trying to destroy God's plan.

Hank Smith: 07:21 Mm-Hmm.

Bro. Eric Richards: 07:22 I think a lot of, at least a lot of the students I have up in Logan,

they worry about that. They make a mistake and they think, I've done too much. I've gone too far. Who am I? I'm just such a natural man. No, you're, let's see, what's the word? Mortal?

Yeah. You're human. You are fallen.

Hank Smith: 07:37 You're what scientists call alive, right?

Bro. Eric Richards: 07:41 Exactly, and the beauty is heavenly Father knows that as he

weighs us, as he looks at what we've become, he knows if we have just have moments of being fallen, he knows that, and he knows if we have truly rebelled against him. Both are handled so differently. <u>Elder Scott</u>, you know the Lord, he deals with rebellion so much differently than he does with weakness, and a

lot of our foibles of human nature to quote Joseph, are because we are fallen, not because we've been rebellious.

John Bytheway: 08:12 I have never thought of that. You're making a distinction

between the natural man and a fallen man, and the natural man is like preferring the natural man. Yeah. Fallen man is more like, yeah, I fall, but I get up again. I'm trying. I'm failing, but I'm getting up again and I'm going to keep trying. Keep repenting.

Bro. Eric Richards: 08:34 Yeah. "Don't you quit", to insert Elder Holland.

Hank Smith: 08:36 Yeah. Speaking of Elder Holland, listen to this. I think maybe he

makes this distinction here too, Eric, this is April, 2010 Place No More for the Enemy of My Soul. Like thieves in the night, unwelcome thoughts can and do seek entrance to our minds. Sounds like fallen man, but we don't have to throw open the door, serve them tea and crumpets, and then tell them where the silverware is kept. You shouldn't be serving tea anyway. He says throw the rascals out. Maybe that's a distinction too, Eric. I didn't seek this out. It enters because I'm a fallen person living in a fallen world, but natural man opens the door, says, come

on in, take over my life.

Bro. Eric Richards: 09:25 Back to the temple recommend wording. Do you strive? Those

that are fallen and weak, they strive, they try. The natural man, there is no effort. There's no pumping the brakes on their way to sinfulness. They're day planner. Don't forget to sin today. There are shirts, I love to sin. There's no interest in repentance at all, but most of us, especially those listening to this podcast, are in that fallen category in my opinion, that we are trying and

we slip up every week and yet we try again.

Hank Smith: 09:58 Yeah. John, how often have we talked about repenting to your

kids?

John Bytheway: 10:02 And how often have we talked about the sacrament table

bolted to the floor in the chapel? Correct. Because the Lord knows you're going to fall down again, but come back.

On verse 46, behold I say unto you, that little children, another shift here, Hank another doctrine. Little children are redeemed from the foundation of the world through mine only begotten. Wherefore, they cannot sin for power is not given unto Satan to tempt little children until they begin to become accountable before me. And this is a beautiful idea here. It's a doctrine I think that is very unique to us as latter-day saints, and it's beautiful to me about the salvation of little children. I mentioned earlier <a href="Patrick Mason">Patrick Mason</a> and his work with the word restoration and restore, and you read an idea from one of his articles about this vineyard, this farm that God has planted. It's called Earth, and he has so many different religions and sects and ideas and people and ideologies and approaches to faith. The latter-day saints have been asked to take care of and cultivate a very unique part of that vineyard.

11:54 I think we have special oversight in a few areas. I think eternal families is something unique to us. The Lord says, I want the latter-day saints. This is one of your unique, beautiful doctrines, priesthood keys, the idea of eternal progression through covenants, the redemption of the dead, a complete view of the plan of salvation, the nature of God, the depth of Jesus Christ's atonement, modern revelation through living prophets. These are unique principles and doctrines to our faith in the New Testament, the Apostle Paul, you know, his analogy is about the body where we have different parts of the body, but all the parts are necessary to make the body run and do its thing. Emma is putting clothes on the clothesline or something. You don't hear the conversation, but you know he's saying, guess what I just learned? Guess what the Lord just revealed to me about this very thing? It's a great moment in the world that he had grown up in, he probably understood similar to what your mother heard as a child.

Hank Smith: 15:23

Eric, this reminds me of something we talked about earlier this year was the death of Alvin Smith, 25 years old. Everybody says later, Joseph Smith says the best of my father's children. Just before he dies, he reaches out to his younger brother Joseph and counsels him to be obedient to what he's been told to do. The family asked a Presbyterian minister in Palmyra to officiate at his funeral. As Alvin had not been a member of the minister's congregation, the clergyman asserted in his sermon that Alvin could not be saved. William Smith, Joseph's younger brother recalled the minister intimated very strongly that Alvin had

gone to hell for Alvin was not a church member, but he was a good boy and my father did not like it. Now I know Alvin's not a little child, as in verse 46, but the principle of a merciful God is the same.

John. You're right on. The more I hear about that type of God, the more repulsive it seems that there's a God who wants to punish people unendingly eternally, something as a latter-day saint, I cannot accept.

Bro. Eric Richards: 17:29

It just doesn't taste right.

There has to be more. There has to be more. If we understand the nature of God and our status as his children, we're not simply created beings. We are literally his spirit sons and daughters, and surely he's going to show mercy to all as much as he can, as much mercies he can offer. That seems to be his default setting is mercy, mercy, mercy.

Hank Smith: 17:54

And redemption. Yeah. You think like Joseph Smith, Eric, I think he said it's God's chief attribute is his mercy. It's not one of his attributes. It is his chief attribute.

It will not last forever. We must take it or leave it. I love it. I love the boldness of that.

Bro. Eric Richards:

Yeah. Winning team. Choosing team.

Right? And anybody listening, you have this chance. Let's take it. Why not seek peace while peace can be obtained?

I think this whole section is just this evidence of the Lord's mercy to tell us I'm going to lay out the whole plan for you. And there's everything in here. There's premortal existence, there's millennium, there's resurrection, there's fall of Adam and Eve. When I look at verse 42, it's okay, here's the point I gave unto Adam and unto his seed, they should not die until I will send forth angels to declare unto them repentance and redemption. If you knew that you would meet the Lord tomorrow, what would you do today? What confessions would you make? What practices would you discontinue? What accounts would you settle? What forgiveness would you extend? What testimonies would you bear? If you would do all those things then, why not now? Isn't that great? He makes a funny little quip here. A 72-hour kit of temporal supplies may prove valuable for earthly challenges, but a 24 hour kit of spiritual preparation is of greater and more enduring value.

Bro. Eric Richards: 24:12

Hello everyone. Welcome to followHIM Favorites. John and I are sharing a single story to go with each week's lesson. John, we're in Doctrine and Covenants section 29, which is all about the second coming. When you think second coming, you think could happen anytime. I better be prepared. All right. This comes from Howard W. Hunter, who told the story of a quarterback on a high school football team. This young man managed to make the team, but it was clear he was not going to be an All State or All American player. Indeed, it didn't look like he was going to be all anything except perhaps all battered and bruised. He was the fourth of four quarterbacks. By season's end, he had never been called into a game and had given up hope. During the final game of the year, he pulled off his shoes, wrapped himself in a blanket and settled down on the bench to watch his buddies play.

Midway through the game, he heard the coach shout his name. He was startled and wondered if he had been mistaken. Then it came again right from the coach's lips, Hey, you get in there and move the ball. What should he do? His first impulse was to lapse into a coma. His second was to pretend he didn't hear. His third was to say, wait, wait while I put on my shoes. He did the only manly thing. Strapping on his helmet as he ran, he made straight for the huddle. His white stocking feet were conspicuous to the players on both teams as well as the spectators and the coach, who also must have been ready to lapse into a coma. He called the play, but the shock of his first game was obviously a little disconcerting. By the time he took the snap from center, he had forgotten the play. His teammates moved to the right, but he gamely went left. There alone against the world he met the opposition head on and was swallowed up in a snarl of onrushing linemen. He later said, no one expected me to make a touchdown. Even running the wrong way was understandable, but there was no excuse for a quarterback without shoes. So the idea is keep your gospel shoes on because you never know. You never know when it's going to be your turn to get called in.
